Chinese:	Used to describe historical and mythological events, philosophies and ideas that occurred or originated in the area that is now recognized as the Peoples Republic of China.
Taiwanese:	Used to describe historical and mythological events, philosophies and ideas that occurred or originated in the area that is now recognized as the Republic of China.
Mainland China:	Used where differentiation is needed between the geographical areas known as the Peoples Republic of China and the Republic of China.
Taiwan:	Used where differentiation is needed between the geographical areas known as the Republic of China and the Peoples Republic of China.
Faith:	A belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny. A belief in a God, deity, or in a particular religion.
Superstition:	An irrational belief connected with ideas about magic, etc.
Family Cult:	A family unit that follows a system of religious beliefs and rituals involving worship of family ancestors.
Utilitarian:	Designed to be useful rather than decorative. Designed to be practical rather than attractive.
Pinyin and Font	
Hanyu Pinyin:	Hanyu Pinyin has been used selectively alongside Chinese names, and for Chinese words and concepts with no English equivalent.
Regular Font:	Regular font has been used for real names of people, deities, places and names of Sanskrit scriptures.
Italics:	Italics have been used for Hanyu Pinyin names of religious texts and Chinese words that are not names of people, deities, places or schools, and words with no English equivalent.
